The checkered walnut "coke bottle" grips with silver S&W medallions are un-numbered and remain in excellent condition showing slightly worn finish, a couple small handling marks along the right panel and crisp checkering throughout. The metal surfaces of this handsome revolver retain 99% original nickel finish, the only noticeable wear being some light circumferential scratches along the rear of the cylinder and one of the flats due to improper disassembly; they generally do not breach the nickel. The latch retains all of its original bright blue, the hammer and triggerguard show bold case-hardened colors throughout with some small areas muing very slightly, and the trigger retains almost all of its fine pale straw color. The barrel markings with "MODEL OF 91" remain crisp and clear. The black checkered hard rubber grips remain in excellent condition showing just a few tiny handling marks, the right panel is scratch-numbered to the gun and the left retains a nice patent marking along its bottom edge. All of the serialized parts are matching, barrel-to-frame fit is excellent and the action seems to function well mechanically with solid timing and lock-up. The revolver includes its original dark green factory box with correct end label and matching pencil number along the bottom. All markings remain crisp and clear. The checkered walnut "elephant ear" grip with silver Colt medallions remains in excellent condition showing areas of slightly worn finish and a few minor handling marks. The pistol is sighted with the correct Stevens adjustable rear sight, Partridge front and the action seems to function well mechanically. The small parts retain most of their rich straw color with some minor silvering along the trigger while the front sight, grip screws and rear spring show nice fire blue with some minor thinning. All markings remain clear and the front of the triggerguard is stamped with private purchase "P" and "60" date. The checkered walnut grips are stamp-numbered to the gun and remain in near excellent condition showing a couple small dings and handling marks. All of the serialized parts are matching and the action seems to function well mechanically. One bright-bodied wood base magazine numbered "40" is included. The metal surfaces of this 1943-production pistol retain about 96% arsenal-reapplied Parkerized finish showing some mild high edge and operational wear along with some scattered light scratches. There is a small area of light scaling at the triggerguard root that appears to be casting flaws from the manufacturing process and all markings remain unmolested and mostly crisp, the ordnance wheel on the right side frame partially struck. The barrel retains about 90% original blue showing silvering and operational wear. The checkered brown Keyes Fibre synthetic grips remain in excellent condition showing a couple scattered tiny dings. The slide stop, safety, hammer spur and mainspring housing are checkered, one blued M. S. Little magazine is included and the action seems to function well mechanically. The included W. D., A. G. O. Form No. 446 Government Property Issue Slip lists a 1911A1 pistol, holster, two magazines, 21 boxes of ammo (Lot S25240) and a bayonet issued to Captain Lloyd C. Santmyer on April 29, 1945. The serial number of the pistol listed is matching this arm, though it is slightly smudged and written in graphite pencil rather than the grease pencil of the other hand-written notations. Also included are some news articles related to Captain Santmyer, photocopy of his special orders to work on glider matters at Wright Field dated July 28, 1943, copies of the books The Officer's Guide and A Place In The Sky signed by editor Richard David Wissolik (Santmyer's exploits are described in the book and he is pictured on the back cover), 1943-dated Boyt U.S. shoulder holster with lightly penciled initials "LCS" in very fine condition, three full 50-round boxes of Evansville 45 ACP ball cartridges Lot S25240, a pair of captain's bars and a U.S. Army Air Corps. officer's coat with 1942-dated label and no visible identification, otherwise in near excellent condition with gilt buttons intact, Army Air Corps. Patch and silver pilot wings. A cutout of the Captain's obituary is also included. Santmyer was born January 2, 1910 and began flying in 1926. While serving in World War Two he is perhaps best known as being the experimental test pilot during the development of the ILS instrument landing system that is used the world over today. He then went on to instruct pilots in the use of this system, trained night fighter squadrons, tested military glider technology and ground-to-air rescue techniques. During and after the war he flew a number of VIPs including Chiang Kai-shek and John F. Kennedy. He retired as the executive pilot of the Allegheny Ludlum Steel Corp. in 1968 but continued flying recreationally and assisting aviation historians with their research. Lloyd C. Santmyer was inducted into the Aviation Pioneer's Hall of Fame in 1976 and passed away on April 24, 2010 at the age of 100. The SR-25 series rifles boast incredible and consistent sub-MOA accuracy at 100 yards using match grade ammunition and the Knights literature says "The trained sniper armed with the KAC MK11 Mod 0 and proper ammunition can consistently hit personnel sized targets at ranges of 1,000 meters". The original version of the SR-25 features a 24" barrel that was determined by the armed forces to be too long for service use, especially when used with the suppressor. The Mk 11 Mod 0 series rifles were completely redesigned with 20" Obermeyer barrels that had the same accuracy guarantee as the longer civilian match models and would meet the overall length restriction when used with the suppressor. This is an incredible tactical package that is as rugged as it is practical and would stand apart in any modern service rifle shoot or long range competition, not to mention its unprecedented tactical potential.
